

# CITY OF LOS ANGELES COUNCIL DISTRICTS

The City of Los Angeles is the second largest city in the United States and spans nearly 500 square miles. It has approximately 4,000,000 residents and is divided into 15 Council Districts (see map on p. 5). The number of residents per Council District range between 240,000 and 290,000. The 15 City Council Districts are currently represented by the following elected officials:

Each district has a population that varies little from one another. However, the districts do vary in geographical size. The current population and size for each district is as follows:

The 24,915 persons counted in 2009 in the City of Los Angeles represent a decrease of 38% when compared to the total number of homeless persons (40,144) in the 2007 Homeless Count. Table 2 provides the decrease for each Council District.

Table 3 provides a breakdown of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons by number and percentage for each Council District. The last row shows that approximately one out of three homeless persons (37%) was sheltered and nearly two out of three homeless persons were unsheltered (63%) for all Council Districts.
