LAHSA's primary role is to coordinate the effective and efficient utilization of Federal and local funding in providing services and housing to homeless people throughout Los Angeles City & County.

LAHSA is governed by a politically appointed, ten-member Commission. The Commission has the authority to make budgetary, funding, planning and program policies. Five members are selected by the County Board of Supervisors and five are chosen by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Los Angeles. This appointment process was determined by the 1993 Joint Powers Agreement between the City and the County that established LAHSA as an independent agency. The Commission Chairperson and Vice Chairperson are elected by the full Commission.

If administrative funds were made available to the CoC, would the primary-decision making body, or its designee, have the capacity to be responsible for activities such as applying for HUD funding and serving as a grantee, providing project oversight, and monitoring. Yes. With administrative funds from HUD, the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority could fulfill all of the above functions. For 16 years, LAHSA has been the primary applicant to HUD on behalf of the Los Angeles Continuum of Care. LAHSA currently administers 283 grants for homeless services, including 129 HUD SHP grants. LAHSA fiscally and programmatically monitors all grants, tracks outcomes, and provides compliance and capacity building training for CoC members. LAHSA is the HMIS administrator for the CoC and is responsible for implementation of this system.

Programs and Evaluation Committee of the LAHSA Commission	This LAHSA Committee reviews project and program design proposals for new and existing LA CoC programs, approves processes for solicitation of proposals, and makes contract recommendations resulting from competitive solicitation processes to the Commission. Policy and Planning Committee of the LAHSA Commission	This LAHSA Committee monitors and tracks the progress of local Ten Year Plan implementation and coordination, reviews and discusses CoC homelessness planning issues and processes, and makes recommendations to the Commission. The committee also makes policy recommendations to the Commission on legislative and policy issues affecting the Los Angeles CoC including state and federal appropriations and authorizing legislation relating to homelessness. Southern California Regional Homeless Management Information (HMIS) Collaborative	This committee meets to coordinate the regional implementation of the HMIS system. The group is responsible for the successful implementation of the LA/OC Regional Collaborative HMIS software application. In addition, this group meets to develop reporting, analysis, and release of information protocols and identification of Continuum and regional data elements for agencies participating in HMIS implementation. In addition, this group provides input regarding technical and training needs as wells as the impact of the HMIS implementation of the operation of homeless programs.	Monthly or more

County of Los Angeles Homeless Deputies Meeting	The purpose of this group is to provide an ongoing forum for County of Los Angeles Homeless Deputies, County departments, housing and service providers, housing developers, and other stakeholders to implement projects that address the unique housing and service needs of special needs populations in the County of Los Angeles. This group coordinates resources and implements critical programs that serve homeless individuals and families, such as the DPSS Programs, Winter Shelter Program, General Relief, and the County's \$100 million Homeless Prevention Initiative commitments. We seek to overcome low participation by non-HUD funded providers by continuing our outreach, education and support efforts, with an emphasis on the advantages of the technical support we provide and the need for data consistency within the Continuum. We are working with the City of Santa Monica to integrate their legacy data system, and are providing technical assistance to facilitate these efforts. We have created user groups to assist in the development of program specific management reports and enhance the process of data review and system feedback. LAHSA is inviting agencies on HMIS, emphasizing the provided support and user trainings, as well as the availability of management reports for the agencies' operational needs. More specifically, we will be working to increase overall system participation by HUD and non-HUD funded providers through our outreach efforts and by improving the quality of the system-generated reports. Finally, immediate improvements in overall bed coverage will come about through the integration of the City of Santa Monica's HMIS data, which will add 16 programs and 530 beds into our CoC's HMIS.

HMIS users are first required to attend trainings in which they learn how to utilize the system. This is complemented by monthly trainings provided by the Program Outcomes Team in which specific data entry and quality issues can be discussed. Once an agency begins using the system, the Data Quality group runs reports based on the data to surface any errors or potential issues. These issues are captured and documented multiple times a week, and are brought to the immediate attention of the non-compliant agency through a series of electronic and written communications in which strategies to correct the data are described.

Describe the existing policies and procedures used to ensure that valid program entry and exit dates are recorded in the HMIS (limit 750 characters):

First, the agency is required to review their contract documentation for rules regarding client program entrance and exit. Next, at the HMIS trainings, the procedure and associated rules with entering and exiting a client are explained. A special focus is placed on agencies with low Information Technology access or knowledge, and with agencies that have historically made errors in these areas. Regular monitoring occurs along with the data quality checks, so that any issues are immediately discovered and addressed. Agencies are also encouraged to run reports to verify the accurate input of entry and exit dates. Finally, the HMIS system also has built-in rules that prevent exit dates from preceding entry dates.

LAHSA compiled a complete inventory of programs in the CoC. Using this inventory, LAHSA trained representatives from each CoC program, and provided instructions on how to collect and report sheltered homeless data.

To create the complete program inventory list, LAHSA updated the 2008 eHIC inventory of emergency and transitional shelters using HMIS and solicited input from CoC providers and LAHSA staff to ensure inventory accuracy.

LAHSA contacted representatives from every agency administering a program on the inventory and requested a count of the homeless sheltered on the nights coinciding with the Street Count. LAHSA contacted all late responding agencies to encourage them to submit their counts to complete a comprehensive sheltered homeless count. Of the 446 shelters and voucher-accepting motels/hotels asked to participate in the PIT Shelter Count, LAHSA obtained a 100% response rate.

For those programs using HMIS as a data collection and reporting tool, quality assurance and verification of numbers reported from each agency was completed by comparing the bed type and capacity with information reported in HMIS.

29% more emergency shelters and transitional housing programs were added to the inventory since the 2007 Homeless Count. This is a direct result of an improved housing inventory data process and and increased effort to ensure a comprehensive inventory with the leadership of the CoC coalitions. Additionally, occupancy rates increased over the 2007 count.

Describe how data on sheltered subpopulations, as reported on 2J, was collected and the subpopulation data produced (limit 1500 characters):

Data on the sheltered Chronically Homeless, Severely Mentally Ill, Chronic Substance Abuse, Veterans, Persons with HIV/AIDS and Victims of Domestic Violence were based on in-depth surveys conducted with homeless persons in shelters and on the streets. (For a person on the street to be identified as sheltered they needed to indicate that they spent the majority of their time in a homeless shelter/vouchered motel room.) HMIS data was used as a validation tools for these subpopulation statistics.

Teams of trained interviewers conducted more than 3000 of these surveys on the streets and in shelters with homeless adults. The results were used to create a statistical projection of homeless subpopulations across the Continuum. The subpopulation categories were strictly based on HUD-mandated definitions.

LAHSA set geographic distribution quotas to achieve statistically valid results in each Service Planning Area (SPA) so that sheltered (and unsheltered) subpopulation estimates could be produced for both the CoC and these smaller geographic regions within the CoC. Los Angeles County is divided into eight distinct SPAs to aid planning efforts for such a large geographical region.

Data on Sheltered Unaccompanied Youth (under 18) was gathered through the Shelter Count. HMIS data and direct reports from homeless providers on the number of unaccompanied youth they were sheltering were compiled.

The 2009 shelter survey featured improved randomization, which may have affected prevalence rates. Selection bias by surveyors was curtailed by requiring that sheltered homeless persons be asked to participate in a pre-determined order. That order was randomly generated by shelter size, and was matched by survey teams to shelter roster numbers.

20. Continuum of Care (CoC) Unsheltered Homeless Population and Subpopulation: Methods

CoCs can use a number of methodologies to count unsheltered homeless persons. These include, but are not limited to:

- Public places count: The CoC conducted a point-in-time count based on observation of unsheltered homeless persons, but without interviews.
- Public places count with interviews: The CoC conducted a point-in-time count and either interviewed all unsheltered homeless persons encountered during the public places count or a sample of these individuals.
- Service-based count: The CoC interviewed people using non-shelter services, such as soup kitchens and drop-in centers, screened for homelessness, and counted those that self-identified as unsheltered homeless persons. In order to obtain an unduplicated count, every person interviewed in a service-based count must be asked where they were sleeping on the night of the last point-in-time count.

Unsheltered Street Count: The CoC was regionally stratified by 8 Service Planning (SPAs) areas to randomly select the census tracts (CT) that were enumerated as part of the unsheltered street count. Using raw data analyzed from the 2007 count, regions with high degrees of variation among CTs were sampled at a higher rate. In addition, CTs referred to as hot spots (those CTs with high concentrations of homeless) were analyzed and had a greater likelihood of being selected through the randomized CT selection process. The sampling and stratification was based on an approach that emphasized randomization at each stage. Trained teams enumerated 754 CTs, or 40% of the CTs in the CoC.

Hidden Homeless Telephone Survey: LAHSA partnered with the University of North Carolina's (UNC) Survey Research Unit, specialists in conducting telephone surveys to understand rare and elusive populations and phenomena. The purpose of the telephone survey was to estimate the number of unsheltered homeless staying on private property that would not be enumerated as part of the street count.

UNC designed a sample to ensure representation of the CoC so that expansion weights could be applied. 28,394 telephone numbers were placed into calling for a minimum of 12 call attempts yielding 4,288 completed interviews. This accounts for a 329% increase in completed calls for this component of the count, compared to 2007.

UNC consulted with HUD, Abt Associates, and the Urban Institute to verify definitions of hidden homeless and to test the survey design instrument and sampling plan. UNC generated a hidden homeless predictor index based on a literature review, which was further refined based on early survey testing data. The index allowed for a stratified sample, using 7 factors.

Demographic Survey: In addition to the public places count, trained teams conducted demographic interviews of a sample of 2,236 unsheltered homeless persons. Homeless persons interviewed outdoors, who indicated that they spent most of their nights outside were categorized as unsheltered.

In addition to providing a comprehensive training, we audited tally sheets as they were completed. Any tally sheets that appear unusual resulted in an immediate same-night recount by a second team of homeless outreach workers or trained enumerators.

Describe the techniques used by the CoC to reduce duplication, otherwise known as de-duplication (limit 1500 characters):

The County of Los Angeles covers over 4000 square miles. The logistics for conducting a point-in-time street count of homeless people in a county this large required the enumeration to take place over a three-day period (January 27-29, 2009).

The County was also divided into eight distinct Service Planning Areas (SPAs) to assist in the logistical coordination of the Count. Based on our experience, we looked at the travel and migration patterns of homeless people and assigned logical groupings of planning areas that minimize the potential for duplication. Therefore, on January 27, SPAs 1, 2, and 5 were enumerated; on January 28, SPAs 3, 7, and 8 were enumerated; and on January 29, SPAs 4 and 6 were enumerated.

To avoid potential duplication between the unsheltered and sheltered homeless, the street and shelter count was conducted on the same nights for the same geographic area, within a narrow timeframe so that sheltered and unsheltered homeless would not commingle. Therefore, the Unsheltered Street Count occurred between 9:00 p.m. and 2:00 a.m. and the shelters were asked to count how many homeless were housed in their facilities at 10:00 p.m. that night.

Describe the CoCs efforts to reduce the number of unsheltered homeless household with dependent children. Discussion should include the CoCs outreach plan (limit 1500 characters):

The Los Angeles CoC has prioritized families and invested significant resources to increase housing for homeless families. The City of Los Angeles has set aside more than 4000 of its Section 8 vouchers for the homeless, 10% of their total allocation.

Over the past year, Los Angeles County has provided over \$10 million in housing funding to help place over 300 families into housing outside of the Skid Row area.

In addition, the CoC is working with both the City and County of Los Angeles to develop specialized family case manager and resource inventories to expedite a family's ability to obtain housing and shelter and increase income to support sustainable housing.

Describe the CoCs efforts to identify and engage persons that routinely sleep on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation (limit 1500 characters):

Under LAHSA's leadership, the Continuum has compiled a comprehensive inventory of all Outreach service providers throughout the County, including subpopulations served, and has begun developing coordinated planning for outreach services throughout the Continuum. Better coordination of outreach services will provide better geographic coverage and reduce duplication in engagement activities between outreach workers.

In addition, the LA CoC has implemented a Vulnerability Index (VI) as a way to identify and prioritize street homeless for housing and services. Use of a VI, and the corresponding creation of a registry of individuals interviewed using the index, are tools for identifying and prioritizing the street homeless population for housing according to length of homelessness and mortality risk. The registry uses database software to list those homeless individuals ranked by the VI and includes a by-name and photograph list of every person. The LA CoC has implemented this strategy for identifying and engaging street homeless in 5 communities (Santa Monica, West Hollywood, Venice, San Fernando Valley and Downtown Los Angeles) and in a large shelter in downtown Los Angeles. It is expected that this strategy will be expanded to several additional CoC communities in the year ahead.

- Monitor and track housing outcomes of family homeless service providers in the LA CoC HMIS by increasing participation by 400 beds.

Create affordable housing units through local development and rental subsidy programs including the City of LA's Affordable Housing Trust Fund, Permanent Supportive Housing Program, and Homeless Section 8 Programs. 2. Develop 1,433 units of affordable housing through the LA County MHSA program, a portion of which will serve families with severe mental illness.

Foster Care:

The LA County Department of Children & Family Services (DCFS) protocol requires a Transitional Independent Living Plan for every youth aged 14 & older in "out of home care" to ensure they are not discharged into homelessness. This protocol complies with California State Child Welfare regulations, which require completion of a Transitional Independent Living Plan (TILP) for youth between 15½ & 16 years who are in placement. The social worker is to ensure that the plan provides for "acquisition of safe and affordable housing, upon emancipation." (California Department of Social Services Manual of Policies and Procedures, Division 31-236 (i)(12)). These case and discharge planning procedures are supported by the provision of State-sponsored transitional housing placement programs (THPP), authorized under Section 11403 of the California Welfare and Institutions Codes. In addition, counties may also participate in the State's license-exempt Transitional Housing Program Plus (THP-plus), for emancipated foster youth, ages, 19-24 (Health & Safety Code, §1559.110 (e) and Welfare & Institutions Code, §11403.2). Los Angeles County participates in both THPP and THP-Plus programs.

As of January 2008, AB1331 was implemented throughout the state. It created a safety net for severely physically and mentally disabled foster youth who are exiting the state system by requiring Counties to submit SSI benefits applications on behalf of eligible youth in advance of their exit from foster care.

Health Care:

In 2006, the LA County Dept of Health Services implemented a policy requiring all persons exiting health care facilities receive assistance finding appropriate housing opportunities and supportive services. It states that persons leaving these institutions shall not be released into homelessness & that McKinney-Vento funded emergency, transitional or permanent housing units should be used as a last resort. Discharges are facilitated by social workers who evaluate each patient who reports being homeless to determine if discharge arrangements can be made with family.

The CoC Hospital Discharge Planning Task Force, facilitated by the Hospital Association of Southern California, conducted training sessions with hospital administrators, social service directors, case workers & emergency department staff to improve discharge planning activities, most recently in July 2009.

Three major hospitals (Kaiser Permanente, Methodist Hospital of So. California & Hollywood Presbyterian Medical Center) in Los Angeles adopted a common discharge planning protocol to ensure homeless patients are not discharged to inappropriate locations. An expanded number of recuperative beds have been set aside for homeless discharged from hospitals.

At the state level, AB 2745 requires that each hospital work with its regional hospital association to develop protocols for the release of homeless patients. The law prohibits hospitals from transferring homeless clients to another County institution.

Mental Health:

Three years ago, the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (DMH) finalized and implemented discharge planning procedures for (1) Acute Care Hospitals, (2) State Mental Hospitals and (3) Institutions for Mental Disease (IMDs) that are designed to ensure that patients are not discharged into homelessness. These county-wide protocols ensure that discharge planning for the homeless occurs from the beginning of treatment. Acute Psychiatric Inpatient contracts were revised to include provisions for similar discharge planning. DMH monitors contracts to ensure compliance with State and Federal laws regarding discharge planning. This ensures compliance with required aftercare plans that are individualized. These plans incorporate the following elements: 1) physical need 2) financial need 3) family involvement (when appropriate) 4) accessibility to services 5) housing need. DMH has also developed program guidelines for outreach and engagement for clients in institutions through Assertive Community Treatment, AB 2034 and Full Service Partnerships programs. The guidelines state that the agency staff must work cooperatively with the institution to coordinate discharge. The agency staff shall assist with locating residential placement/housing.

These improved discharge planning protocols are leveraged with funding from the Mental Health Services Act to create housing for clients with severe mental illness who are homeless and at-risk of homelessness.

Corrections:

Correctional facilities operated by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department are the only substantial source of prison and jail capacity in the LA CoC, holding approximately 20,000 prisoners on any given night. Their discharge protocols cover the vast majority of correctional facilities in the county.

The Sheriff Department's Community Transition Unit (CTU) prepares prisoners for social reintegration by 1) preventing discharge into homelessness by creating linkages to appropriate resources, 2) ensuring staff is responsible for completing discharge plans for each prisoner, 3) ensuring discharge plans include educational, housing, job training, health care, entitlements assistance, advocacy, community linkages, social work and mental health components where applicable.

The CTU provides case managers, including night staff, to assist homeless people prior to and during release. CTU coordinates mental health, hospitalization & benefits enrollment with relevant county departments. For example, the Department of Mental Health provides staff to assist transitioning homeless inmates into housing and ensures that inmates stay on schedule with their medications. The Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) identifies individuals scheduled for release that are eligible for mainstream benefit programs. DPSS works with the Department of Health Services to ensure that inmates being discharged to/from hospitals are also targeted for benefits enrollment.

3C. Continuum of Care (CoC) Coordination

County of Los Angeles:

The County stated the goal of providing increased funding of \$100 million for innovative solutions to homelessness through the Homeless Prevention Initiative (HPI).

-LA City will provide \$29.4 million in HPRP financial assistance & services to those who are homeless & at risk of homelessness. As the LA CoC lead agency, LAHSA will administer the City's program. 3 rapid rehousing regional coordinating agencies(RCAs)within the City will provide services & will be required to target clients in CoC-funded transitional housing & emergency shelters. A Citywide vehicular outreach program will link eligible households living in vehicles to the RCAs for rapid rehousing. In partnership with several CoC agencies, 2 legal aid organizations will provide homelessness prevention financial assistance & services. Priority will be given to those at risk of homelessness & living in HUD-subsidized housing. The CoC's HMIS will be used to track & monitor housing outcomes.

-LA County will provide \$12.2 million in HPRP financial assistance & services to those who are homeless & those at risk of homelessness. 4 County departments will provide HPRP-funded assistance & will receive referrals from providers working within the CoC. The CoC's HMIS will be used to track & monitor housing outcomes.

-18 additional entitlement jurisdictions in the LA CoC received direct HPRP allocations totaling approximately \$17 million from HUD. 3 non-entitlement jurisdictions in the LA CoC received awards totaling approximately \$3 million through the State of CA HPRP competition. Cities with HPRP-funded programs will track & monitor housing outcomes through the LA CoC HMIS.

Describe how the CoC is participating in or coordinating with the local Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) initiative, HUD VASH, and/or any HUD managed American Reinvestment and Recovery Act programs (2500 character limit)?

The CoC continues to encompass a variety of LA City and County program activities and other HUD-funded program resources. On behalf of the LA CoC, LAHSA provides policy and programmatic recommendations to the departments that administer these programs:

VASH: In 2008, the City of LA received 840 VASH Vouchers and, in 2009, will receive an additional 105 VASH Vouchers. As of September 2009, 738 VASH Vouchers have been issued and, subsequently, 345 VASH recipients have moved into housing. The City of LA will also provide HPRP move-in assistance to VASH recipients. In 2009, the County of LA will receive 280 VASH Vouchers. The City and County of LA are working closely with the VA to expedite lease up to eligible veterans.

NSP: The City of LA will use NSP2 funds to enhance the NSP1 Walk-In Buyer and REO Bulk Purchase programs. Through NSP1 and proposed NSP2 activities, the City of LA will acquire, rehabilitate and re-sell up to 1,500 housing units. The County of LA NSP2 funding will supplement NSP1 HERO homebuyer and Rental Infill Sites programs.

CDBG-R: City of LA activities include: Citywide HPRP Strategy will provide HPRP-type rental assistance to households with incomes between 51% to 80% of AMI; Streets or Services program will provide homeless misdemeanor arrestees housing placement, case management and referrals into transitional and permanent housing within the LA CoC; Los Angeles Preservation, Recovery and Opportunity Program will coordinate services among foreclosure prevention, credit repair and legal counseling agencies, and give competitive grants to HUD-approved housing counseling and legal services agencies providing a streamlined referral system for City residents. CDBG-R funds will also provide matching funds for City PSH projects submitted to the California Department of Housing and Community Development for Proposition 1C funding.

CSBG-R: 150 Transition Age Youth General Relief recipients who receive County HPRP assistance will be linked to subsidized employment through County ARRA CSBG.

ARRA WIA: The City of LA will utilize ARRA WIA funds to expand core services to 650 clients from vulnerable populations, including homeless. HPRP participants will be referred to WIA-funded WorkSource centers.

The lack of available permanent supportive housing and affordable housing relative to the need is the central challenge for the Los Angeles CoC in meeting the objective of increasing the percentage of homeless persons moving from transitional housing to permanent housing to at least 63.5%. According to the 2007 Southern California Association of Governments Regional Housing Needs Assessment, LA County needs 70,117 units of affordable housing for very low income households.

While the CoC did not meet the HUD goal this year, substantial progress has been made over the past 2 years. Over that period, TH to PH placements have increased from 40% to 54%.

This is done by comparing client income, as well as employment and benefits enrollment status, at the times of entrance into and exit from the program. This is done to measure improvement in the number of clients who increased their income, obtained employment and/or were linked to mainstream programs. LAHSA then works with underperforming agencies to create a strategy to improve performance. Program performance, as it relates to accessing and improving access to mainstream programs, is also reported quarterly to the LAHSA Programs and Evaluation Committee and the LAHSA Commission.
